Feed themselves.

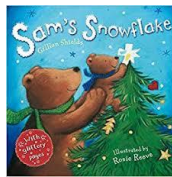

The children will be attempting to make their own books, to retell a story! At home, have a go at making up your own story.

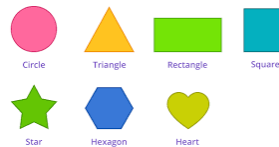


Communication and Language
