Pupil Premium Grant 2018

For the financial year 2018-2019, we have been allocated £98,109 to ensure that children in receipt of pupil premium funding achieve as well as other children, academically, socially and emotionally. Rates for eligible pupils:

£1,320 per pupil - Reception to Year 2 children recorded as Ever 6 FSM

£2,300 per pupil - Children who are looked after, adopted or living under a special guardianship (from April 2018)

£300 per pupil Service children

Current Barriers to Future Attainment: 2018

Boys' attainment – in maths is significantly below that of other boys (15%) and PPG girls (11%). Only 44% of disadvantaged boys in year 1 achieved working at or above expected standard. Only 60% of boys in EYFS attained a good level of development in comparison to 68% of other boys.

Girls' attainment – in reading is significantly below that of other girls (15%) and PPG boys (8%). Disadvantaged girls attainment at EYFS although above all boys attainment is 19% below that of other girls.

In Year 1 PPG attainment is still below that of other children e.g. the phonics gap was 9.6% below that of other children.

Year 2 – there is a large attainment gap between disadvantaged and other children within the Year 2 cohort in maths (7.5%) and overall in RWM (7.3%).

Attendance of Disadvantaged Pupils – Based on data analysis for the 2017-18 school year, the attendance rate for disadvantaged children is 2% lower than other children. Whilst this has been affected by some very specific complex cases, it remains an area to address.

Our overriding priority is to improve the progress of our pupils and to close the gap in attainment between our disadvantaged pupils and their peers. Our spending is on items that we believe will have a measurable impact on the progress, attainment and well-being of the pupils.

In addition to an academic focus, the funding is also used to develop the social and emotional wellbeing of pupils. Interventions that support this area of development have been shown to have a positive impact on learning.

Impact of 2017/18 Spend

Disadvantaged Year 1 girls' phonics results are above the Croydon and National figures (+1.9%).

The reading and writing gaps at KS1 have been closed for both boys and girls against their own cohort.

We continue to focus on the attendance of the disadvantaged to ensure it is not a barrier to learning and use our Educational Welfare Officer where needed to tackle the absence of disadvantaged pupils. The strategies used by our attendance officer have made in roads to improving the attendance and punctuality of children.
