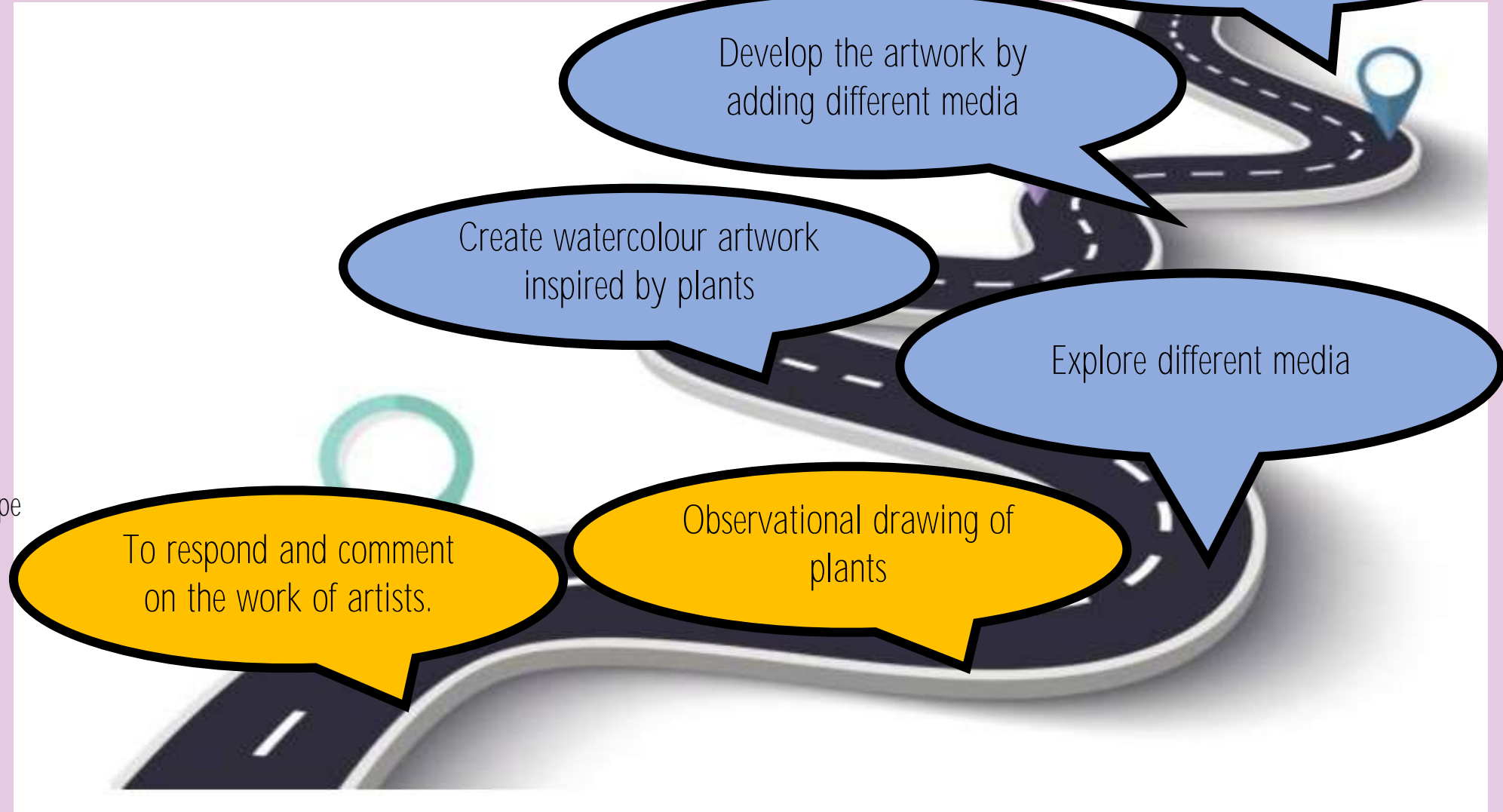

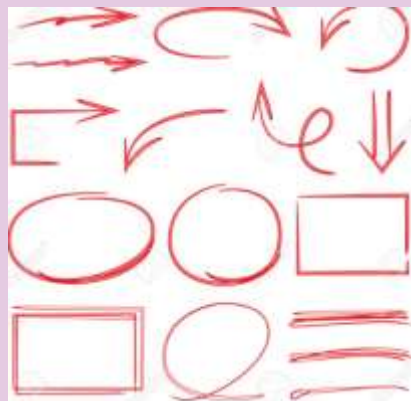

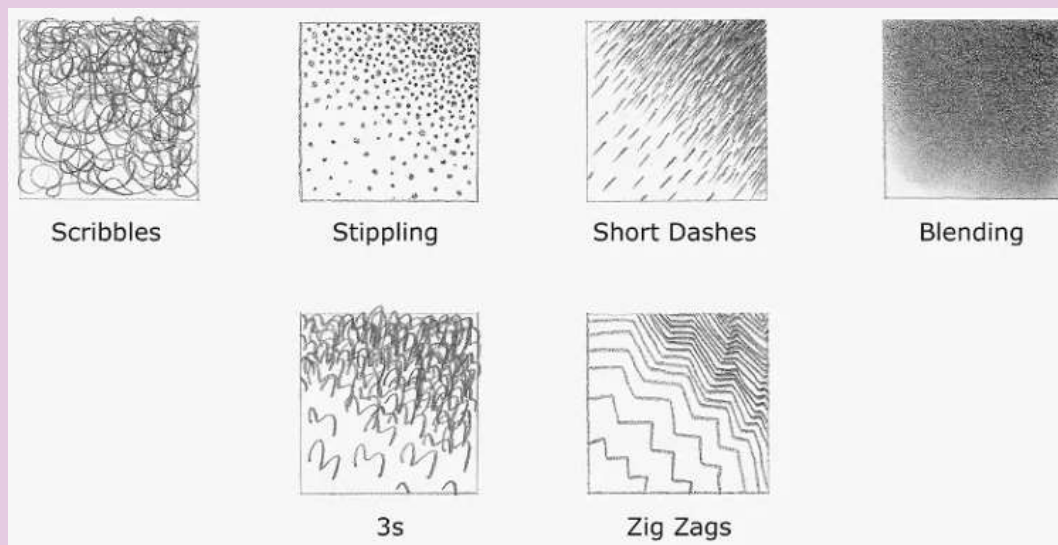

Observational drawing is when we look closely at something and draw what we see.

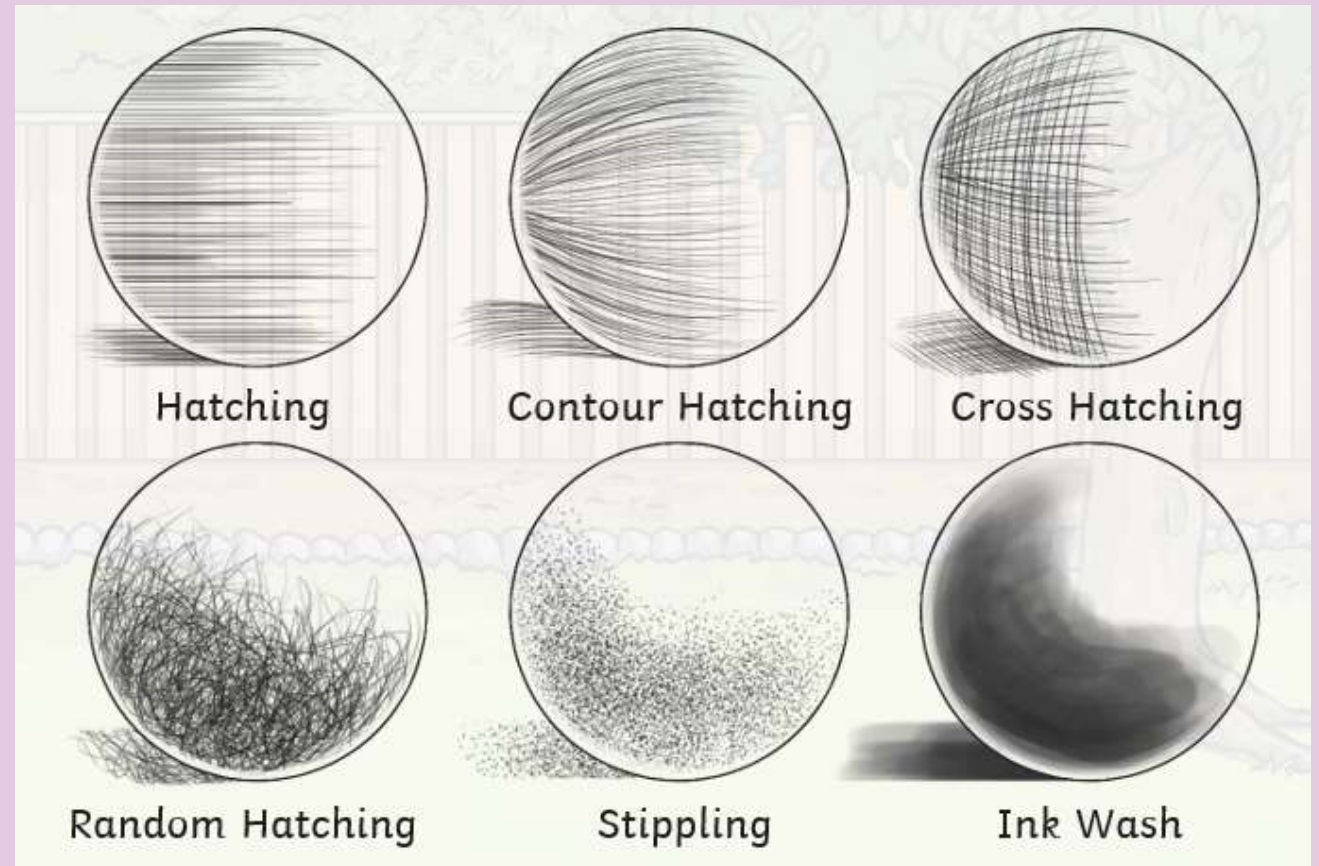
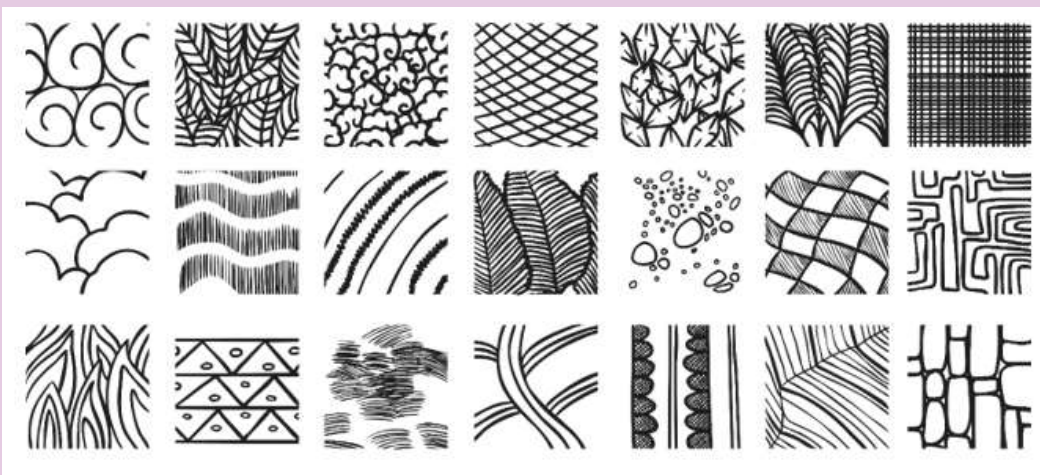
These are some examples of observational drawings.

When we create texture it makes the object look more realistic.



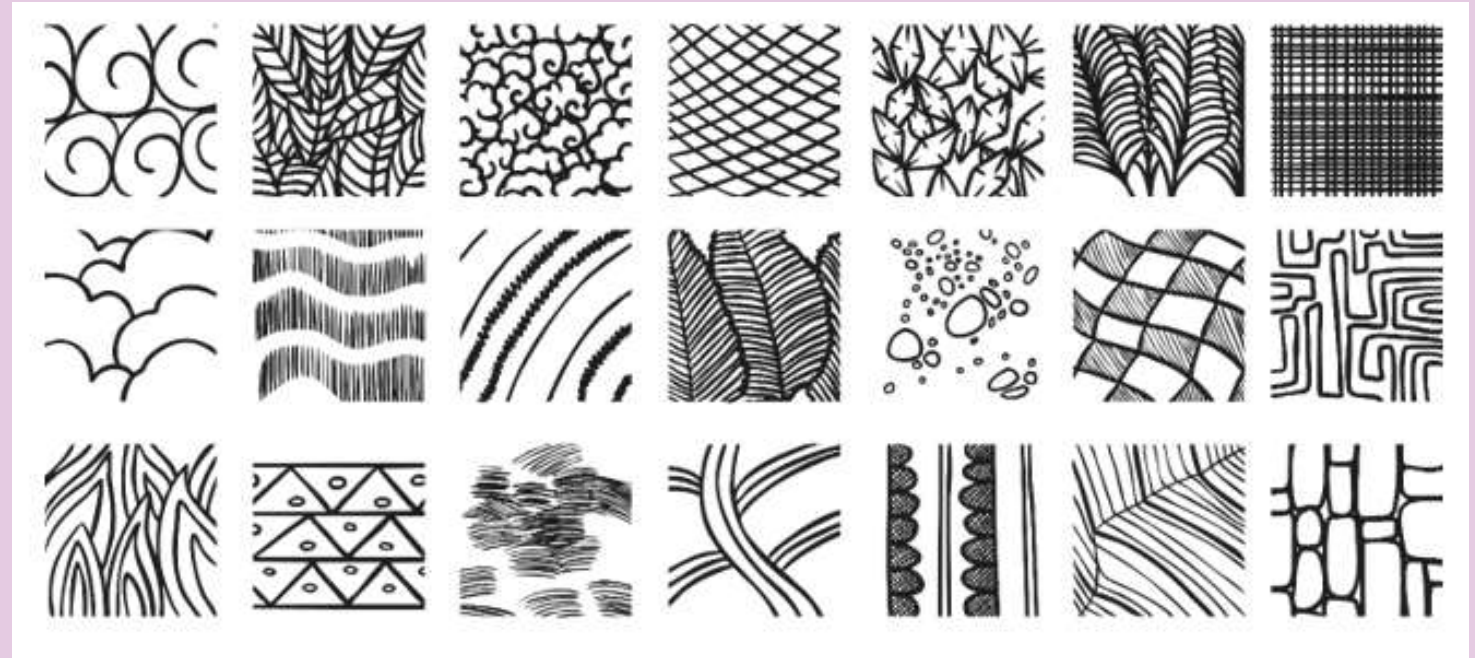
