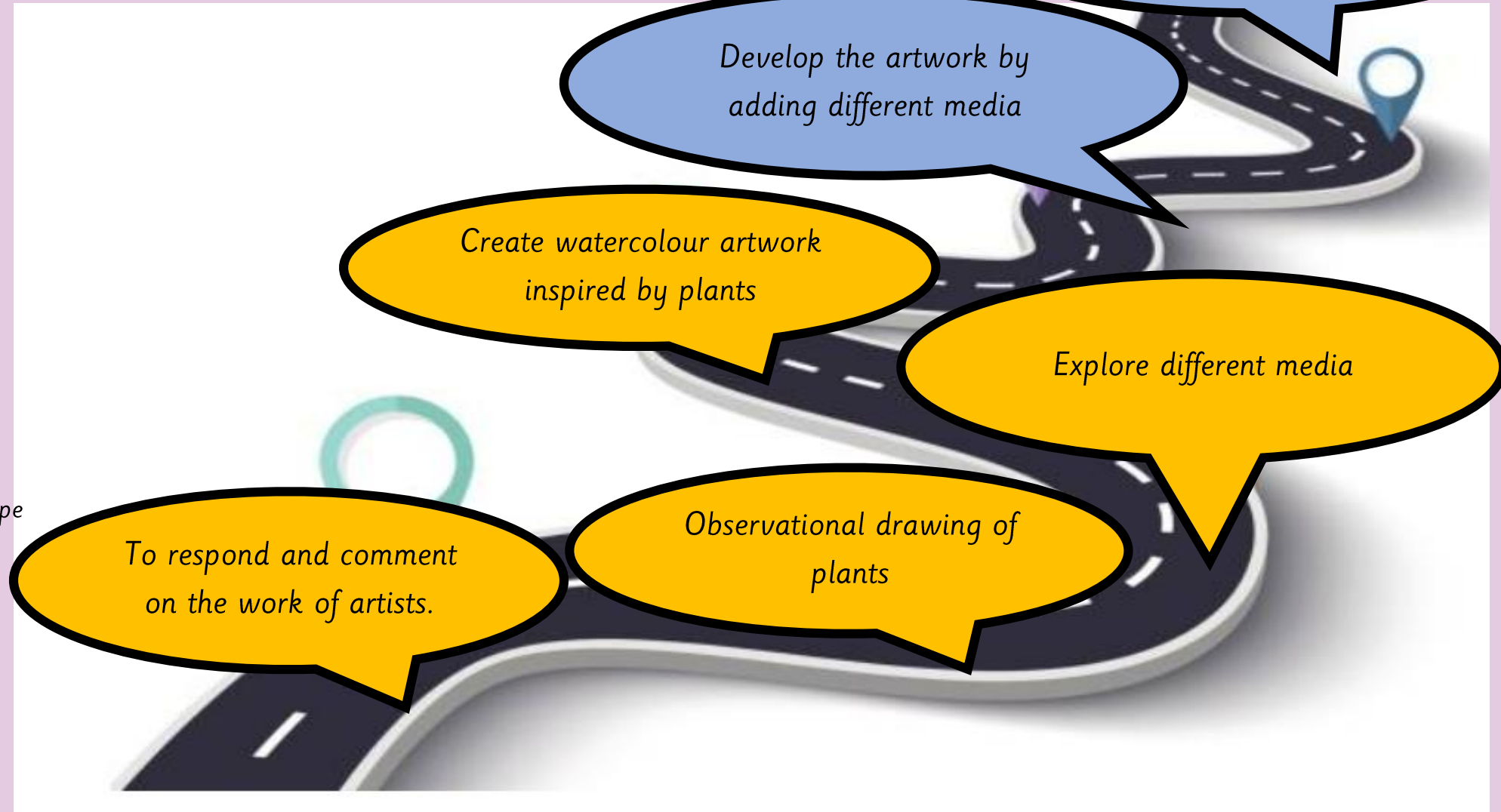

Steps to success

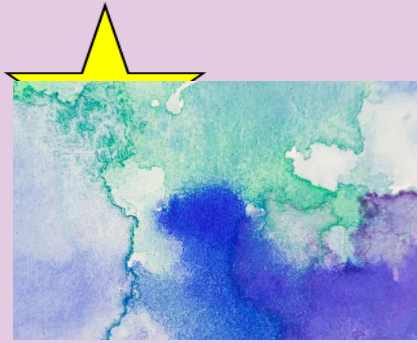
All- I can create an artwork as a basic representation of what I have observed.

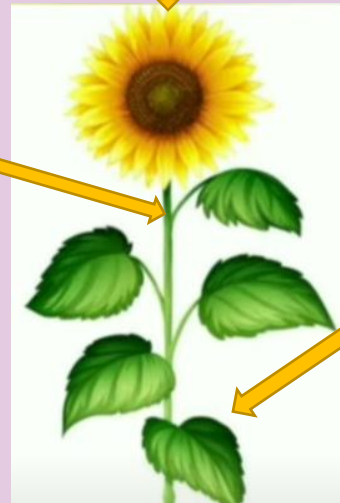
